- 1. The \$460K price for buying 541 Washington Road (Article 4) remained unchanged. Selectmen now state this is for future space needs. Clarifications made to say there is a house on the lot and it is a possible site for a new Town Hall. Click Here, re-opened Click Here
- **2.** Multiple attempts failed to narrow the scope of Article 11, \$60K to study the five options the Town Hall Committee suggested, <u>Click Here</u>
- 3. Town Budget moved through without much questioning Click Here
- **4.** Article 22 (restricting Town Hall options to those that save the building) was amended to still allow for demolition of the Town Hall building. Click Here
- **5.** Selectmen amended and are now supporting Article 21 for Beach Parking kiosks to be voted on in 2017. Click Here

- 1. An amendment by the School Board Chairman to reduce the budget by \$60,000 carried. That amount reflected the removal of funds for an additional bus route in case Portsmouth High School implemented an earlier start to the school day inasmuch as that now appears unlikely in the coming year. More Detail
- 2. An amendment to reduce the Elementary School heating oil budget by \$4305 failed to pass. That would have reduced the budgeted price per gallon from \$3.19 to \$2.90 to correct an arithmetic error on the face of the budget. More Detail
- 3. There were a few questions about the transfer of \$60,000 in excess Wedgewood Farm donations to an expendable trust. More Detail
- 4. The rationale for a \$10,000 expendable trust for unanticipated heating oil costs was given. More Detail

- **2.** A letter from the Historic District Commission Chairman was read and would be filed. The letter requests that, if the town acquires the parcel at 541 Washington Rd., that it comply with the Zoning Ordinance section relating to the Historic District. More Detail
- **3.** The Selectmen cited a decision by a single judge in Grafton County, now on appeal to the New Hampshire Supreme Court, to support its decision to start placing its recommendations for or against certain nonmoney petitioned warrant articles, on the warrant and the ballot. More Detail
- **4.** The President of the Rye Civic League explained the rare circumstances under which its directors would be speaking in an official capacity. More Detail
- **5.** There was no action on a request by the Islander Magazine to obtain cooperation from Town employees in the publication of an edition for Rye residents. Selectman Musselman expressed concern that the Heritage Commission could give them anything that they wanted, and it would go out with the imprimatur of the Town. More Detail
- **6.** The Town roads are in good shape according to an automated scan recently done. The cost to bring them to 100 percent would be \$5.4 million. A resident questioned whether dividing that by a 15 year life to come up with a \$350,000 annual target for the paving budget was an

- 2. The Beach Committee issued its report to the Selectmen. There was discussion about the possible implementation of parking kiosks. Senator Stiles was present and promised to arrange a meeting with the new DOT head. More Detail
- **3**. Planning Administrator Kim Reed was defended in letters from a non-resident attorney and the ZBA Chairman after a resident suggested that the Town invest in a professional Town Planner. <u>More Detail</u>

- **1.** Beth Yeaton (District Clerk), Giselle Chagnon (Math Specialist) and Patricia Dowey (Special Education Director) all announced their resignations.
- **2.** Collective Bargaining Agreement was not agreed to with the RESPA. Negotiations will resume in the Fall of 2016, the current CBA will remain in effect until July 2017.
- **3.** The Curriculum Cabinet had its first meeting and "included the definition of curriculum"
- **4.** The SAU is investigating Competency based approach, Ms. Killen suggested the board watch this video Click Here
- **5.** RES Student Council raised \$1,000 and donated it to the Pease Greeters.
- **6.** 8th Graders had their PHS Set UP day, this was a new format, response was positive.
- **7.** RJH Structure Committee will present the first set of suggestions at the Feb. 29th School Board meeting. 2016/2017 will be a transition year.
- **8.** RJH is \$5,000 per year more expensive then Portsmouth Middle School, so the New Castle School Board is looking at allowing parents to choose either school.
- **9.** PHS later start time will not happen in September, but PHS will continue to look at this.
- **10.** There are two school board seats open. Scott Marrion is the only person running. The second seat will be filled by a write in candidate.

- 1. Lack of storm water runoff management, failed septic systems and other factors are polluting the Parson's Creek Watershed
- 2. For 35 years testing has confirmed septic system pollution.
- **3.** 104 col/100mL is the upper limit, a sample greater then 24,000 col/100ml was found (see page 17 of the 2015 report) with many others above 3,000 col/100ml
- **4.** Rye has received over \$170K in State grants, with Rye's contributions being "contributions in kind" from the DPW and Planning Administrator.
- **5.** Rye does not currently have dedicated funding to accelerate corrective actions.

- 1. The Planning Board Long Range Planning (LRP) Committee met 3 times in January with staff members of the Rockingham Planning Commission (RPC), working under a grant, to draft a new Master Plan chapter, Climate Change, and with Town funding to rewrite/edit three other related chapters.
- **2**. Per the LRP minutes (January 14th, 2016), "The sole mission of the LRP committee is to address 'Tides to Storms' in the Master Plan." As a new chapter, Climate Change, is being drafted.
- **3.** Three chapters, Transportation, Natural Resources, and Land Use, will be rewritten/edited. The RPC is working with the Town on this update of the Master Plan.
- **4**. The RPC informed Rye, that in the last Master Plan update (approved March 2014), those three chapters where either underdeveloped, confusing, or lacking a cohesive and comprehensive approach and action plan. <u>Click Here</u> to read that memo.
