After six months of work with the Town of Rye Departments and Commissions, the Capital Improvement Plan [CIP] Committee has completed the six year [2017-2022] study of capital outlay needs. The CIP Committee recommendations are based upon a scale of priorities. Priority One is to secure life and property. Priority Two is to maintain the present standard of living. Priority Three is to improve the community consistent with the Rye Master Plan. The Recommendations made in this CIP are:

- **1.**The CIP Committee agrees school security is the number 1 priority.
- **2.**The CIP Committee recommends the replacement of the Public Works Dump Truck #108. It is in poor condition.
- 3. The Town Hall redesign reflects a revised placeholder of \$2.9MM in 2018.
- **4.**To fund a new Quint Fire Truck in 2018 the CIP recommends a warrant article to add to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund. A new Quint Fire Truck estimated at \$575K.
- **5.** The CIP Committee recommends the delay of the Conservation Bond \$3MM and the Recreation Community Center Building at \$2.5MM pending the Town Hall design decision. The CIP was accepted by the Board of Selectmen at their meeting on November 28, 2016.
