- 1. Kevin Wunderly was promoted to Fire Lieutenant and was sworn in (6:18 elapsed).
- 2. Selectman Winslow was elected Chairman of the Select Board, Retiring Selectman Jenness was present as Selectman elect Bill Epperson was out of State. (29:18 elapsed).
- **3.** Two members of Rye's state legislative delegation described legislation enacted to date and the upcoming "crossover" whereby bills passed in the House are considered by the Senate and vice versa. Representative Grote was quizzed about a new capital gains tax and Senator Sherman was quizzed about hos a tax on earnings to support family leave is not an income tax and his position. Much discussion on Keno for NH. (41:33 elapsed).
- **4**. Over objections by those present for the public hearing, the Select Board imposed an extensive fee schedule of 111 items, most of which increased, and 44 of which are new fees (73:16 elapsed). Click Here for list. Click Here for Public Notice.

1. 2 New Police Officers Sworn-in Chief Walsh introduced Charles (Chad) Graham from Hampton Falls and Josh McAllister from Epping. Both officers were sworn in. (3:00 elapsed)

2. Art Ditto reported on Seacoast Drinking Water Commission and House Bill 495. (8:10 elapsed)

This commission will run through November 1, 2029. The new commission requests 2 representatives from Rye, including a representative from the Rye Water District.

- **3**. Corey Belden for the Rye Recreation Commission provided an update on the plans for a new storage facility. 150K was approved for this project in 2018. A building permit was submitted on 3.11.19. (15:30 elapsed)
- **4.** Chief Walsh reported on issues with the parking on Central Road near St. Theresa's Church. Chief Walsh asked the Board to implement a temporary town parking ordinance for "No Parking" on one side of Central Road on Saturday and Sunday. The Board agreed to hold a public hearing. (29:42 elapsed)
- **5**. Selectman Roman explained that the town of Hampton had challenged the State because they believed it was not getting enough help with the beaches. Some issues pertained to police and fire. The board agreed to obtain the Hampton plan and hold a working session to identify Rye's needs. (45:30 elapsed)
- **6.** Mr. Herlihy presented an album to retiring Select Board Chair Pricilla Jennes. Mr. Herlihy explained that over the years he has created personalized albums with photos for friends that have reach milestones in their lives. As the 3.11.19 Select Board meeting was one of the last official duties for Chair Priscilla Jenness. The album highlighted her achievements and contributions of Mrs. Jenness. (58:30 elapsed)

The document is fluid. The intention of the RCL is to revise the Handbook at least annually in response to changes in staff, board and committee memberships, and the laws.
