 With the Select Board scheduled to vote October 14th to move Becky Bergeron from acting to the Town Administrator, the job description to hire a full time Financial Director was approved.

3. Aquariion Water answered questions about the sequence of events surrounding the Boil Water Alert, why the Select Board was not notified and how communications can be approved. <u>Click Here</u> for time line of events. <u>DES Information</u> on water boil procedures.

4. NH is rolling out an alert system. Residents can sign up at <u>ReadyNH.gov</u> or <u>here</u>.
5. Once Select Board had the list of people who expressed interest in the Town Center Committee they determined the mix of skills and perspectives for the committee.

6. Police Chief has distributed a <u>letter</u> concerning speeding to residents, Cheif emphasized that when there are crimes and other non-planned work, shift officers are not available to be on the streets deterring speeding. Chair Winslow reported that over the past 6 weeks Wallis Rd had 45 tickets issued, second only to Ocean Blvd's 47 tickets.

7. 2020 Budget may included staffing increases for Recreation & Sewer, Building Department part time (assisting Building Department and Planning Administrator, Clerk's office is looking at records retention, software upgrade for Tax Collector's office.

8. Fire Chief outlined CIP items, such as new gear, cardiac monitor, jaws of life, RTV fourwheel drive Utility with EMS (\$30K), training for Jet Ski.

9. Police Chief is looking at new cruiser, portable radios, rifles, training and new parking software.

10. DPW looking at Street Scanning for roads, drainage repairs, Shoals View Drive, Salt Shed, second Trash Compactor, Truck Replacement and paving.
