- 2) Resident points out that there has been no town discussion about the Cell Tower consultants' recommendation that Rye address the lack of ordinances to address small cells and other communication equipment being deployed.
- 3) Resident points out that Planning Board and Beach Committee appear to be unaware that in December 2017 the State informed Rye that Parson's Creek Watershed is over saturated with leach fields.

It has continued and funded two to three ambulances. The Select Board declined a recent offer of a lump sum payment, but this request should have gone to the Conservation Commission.




