February 2021 Highlights

1) Rye Conservation Commission (RCC) is purchasing the TD Bank property for \$700K and will be deeding the building and 1.4 acres to the Town. The other 2.3 acres will remain with RCC. The Library Board of Trustees is providing \$400K of the funds and in return will become the custodian of the Parsonage lot. The remaining \$300K be paid from bonds available to RCC (Select Board is loaning RCC \$300K to close the transaction).

- 1) Select Board discussed plans to use the proceeds from the sale of Trolley Barn to fund the move of Town Clerk functions to TD Bank and relocation of 2nd floor offices to the 1st floor of Town Hall.

- 1) After multiple requests from S. Borne, the Town Administrator will see that departments post information of public interest on the Town Website first. Current practice had been to physically post on bulletin boards and post online the day before subsequent meetings.



- 1) 1215 Ocean Blvd (Wallis Rd Intersection). Major Development had a court ruing for the Planning Board to confirm that two of the four conditions have been met. - 3) Current Land Development Regulations added back allowing hammerhead turnaround a street design Other options for a dead-end street are a cul de sac or a tear drop. Past Land Development Regulations had specifications for how they impact frontage calculations. This Public Hearing had this removed until specifications can be added.
- **4)** Eversource requested that the Town Administrator help with a Public Discussion regarding tree trimming. This counters the current process that requires Eversource go to the Planning Board and then use the established communication process for residents.

- 1) 146 Perkins Rd drive was built differently than the plan. Lawyer claimed that what has already been built changing it would now be a hardship. Application was declared not complete due to storm water regulations.
- **2)** 850 Washington Rd Major sub-division was at the TRC on Feb 3rd and was declared not complete for multiple reasons. Much discussion as applicant representative argued their interpretation of the regulations.
- 3) 33 Sagamore Rd. Major Site Development application complete and continued to March 9th.
- **4)** 1215 Ocean Blvd major site development went to court which ruled that 2 conditions need to be approved by the planning board.
- **5)** 711 Long John Rd. 3-lot Subdivision Property may be better suited for just two lots considering all that has to be done to meet requirements. Multiple waivers were granted, one passed 4 to 3, continued to March 9th. See diagrams from zoom: Click Here slides 7 to 10
- **6)** Attorney Donavan raised that hammerhead turnarounds were put back in the Land Use Regulations (LDR) but without standards. Public Hearing set to remove them from the LDR was held on February 23rd.
- 7) Planning Board still spending time addressing the non-compliance of the building and actions at the Stoneleigh Development (420 South Rd).

- 2) 200 Parsons Rd. 41 yards of material were removed, site walk is needed in the spring
