4) Portsmouth, Aquarion, and Rye Water met with the Select Board to discuss consistent policies for water conservation during droughts.

In March, the Rye Civic League sent a survey out to those on the Civic News distribution to understand what's on the minds of our fellow residents. The survey asked: What are your top 3 issues (in order of priority) that are of concern. Over 120 people responded.

The top issues are 1) Beach (Traffic, crowds, noise, etc.), 2) Long term planning, and 3) Water Quality.

We will be sending the cleansed survey data and results analysis to the Select Board and Town Committees. We are asking the Select Board and Town Committees to:

1. Include in future meeting agendas a discussion of relevant survey findings and

2. Have the Select Board and the relevant Committee or Commission coordinate on responding to Town's people.

We encourage the Select Board and Town Committees to facilitate dialogue with constituents and hope to see open, public discussions be held.

1) Library Trustee communicated the short term plans for making the former Parsonage land available for public use.

2) Outgoing Library Trustee makes statement about Select Board actions in association with the TD Bank and Parsonage court settlement. <u>Click Here</u> starts at <u>14:00</u>

3) New Police Administrative Assistant was introduced.

4) Mask ordinance discussed. Masks continue to be required in Town Hall for the public. One Select Board member is concerned that residents may not vote on July 13th masks are required. Discussion starts at <u>27:40</u>

5) Town is in favor of allowing the outdoor seating for restaurants to continue. However full indoor capacity and additional outdoor seating may raise parking, septic and other concerns.

6) Select Board approved the acceptance of the 12 acres donated to the Conservation Commission. It was noted that the Select Board should approve first, as the land had already legally been conveyed to Rye. <u>Click Here</u> to see location

7) Select Board and Police Chief agreed to support making Alder and Tower Ave no parking by ordinance. A 2022 Town Vote would make this permanent.

1) Trolley Barn/Old Police Station<u>sold</u> for \$411K, it was the only bid. \$280K will be spent on refurbishing the TD Bank. This is in addition to the \$700K Rye paid in the TD Bank court settlement.

2) Rye Conservation Commission Chair apologized for the last meeting minutes not including the letter from the two Washington Rd. property owners who are impacted by the public (dogs) use of the Town Forrest. <u>Click Here</u> for letter to SB. <u>Click Here</u> for letter to RCC

3) Residents raised concerns about traffic increases and noise in the center of town. SB were informed that the poor condition of the Parsons Field platform may be a safety hazard.

4) With Lee Arthur stepping down from Rye Recreation, that before a commitment is made to a new hire, the SB should lead a public discussion of Rye Recreation and possibly expanding its charter. In public comment, it was pointed out that the Select Board hired the Town Administrator and Fire Chief without public discussion.

5) Select Board acknowledged the resident letter informing the Select Board of the 1978 Natural Resource Inventory from the Conservation Commission and the 1985 Master Plan that should be leveraged for the Master Planning Visioning chapter and hopefully a best in class Master Plan rework. Click Here

6) Select Board invited Portsmouth DPW, Aquarion Water and Rye Water to discuss a coordinated approach to address water conservation for the next drought as there were inconsistencies across the area and its one common aquifer the communities are drawing from. Plan was not discussed at the May 24th meeting as requested in the May 10th meeting.

7) Summer Sessions Surf camps and lessons were approved with the curtailed options and capacities.

8) Rye PTA will be hosting Thursday Yoga on Parsons Field from 4pm to 5:30pm through Sept. 30th.]

9) Select Board approved the Rye Recreation Director job description.

10) RTCC and residents are advocating for slowing traffic in the center of town as it appeared that the Police Chief is not in favor of different speeds on roads, DPW director was not advocating for action and part of the Select Board did not support slowing traffic. Town Administrator was requested to organize a follow up discussion with RTCC. June 3rd continuation. <u>Click Here More Detail</u>

11) Town Hall renovation architecture work can not start until later this summer with possible work completed by next Summer (2022).

12) A second full time Building Inspector was approved as the part time position has gone unfilled. The Select Board indicated a need to better monitor the increase in housing rentals and the related growing volume of approved conditions for the Planning Board. Next step is a discussion with the Budget Committee.

Rye Water Annual Meeting: May 22nd

2021 Rye Water District Warrant: Click Here:

1) \$1,722,325 budget approved. Budget increases driven by captial outlays, engineering work for new wells and older well and the costs to connect the new well.

2) Approved new truck and plow to clear the 300 RWD hydrants.

3) \$45K approved for expendable maintenance funds.

4) Commissioners did not address public question about combining with the Sewer Commission.

5) Public discussion asked about an upper limit for development before the aquifer could not support the water needs, the commissioners only reported that its a function of conservation.

1) Wright Pierce reported Garland pumphouse and Wallis Rd work is finalizing. Wallis Rd. work may start after Labor Day.

2) Cedar Run well replacement has stalled as the "sanitary ring", around the well cuts through private property and one owner was not informed when they should have been. Editors note: Owner explained to the Civic League this is complicated as he did some work without permits and since then the Town has been making each steps very difficult.

3) Continued investigation of additonal wells, working with Conservation for Rand property investigation.

4) Discussion with Select Board and Town Administrator about getting ahead with plans to manage water conservation for the next drought.

5) Assistant Superintendent is continuing effort to control high water usage due to leakage and potential service line leaks.

6) Continued discussion of the impact of Rt. 1 development and impact to Rye Water.

Sewer Commission Meeting: May 18th

Draft meeting minutes: Click Here

1) Church Pump 1 was down and had to be replaced, Abenaqui Pump Station was pulled for inspection and failed. This left only one operating pump.

2) Abenaqui Pump station needs a full upgrade, pumps, control panel and generator.

3) Discussion with the Select Board for Federal Fund to support extending the Portsmouth Sewer on Rt. 1 from Portsmouth to the Rye/N. Hampton line. Select Board said the septic systems for a potential 120 new housing units (current work, proposals and Rye Air field development) could overwhelm area. There are also the Coakley Landfill issues. Rye Water is also concerned about the stress this demand will put on existing infrastructure.

4) Discussions about sewer capacity in Hampton and Portsmouth as there are many large developments in Portsmouth.

5) Resident stressed the need for the Sewer Commission to be active in updates to the Rye Master Plan.


6) Resident informed the commissioners that there are nine septic systems in the sanitary ring of

Aquarion well 5A and wanted the Commission to be aware so that these homes could be added to the Sewer system if there is an expansion.

7) Discussion of options to handle the unanticipated costs of the pump failures.

8) Abenaqui Country Club grease trap was not functioning properly was the cause of the grease fund in the pump.

9) 82 South Rd and 1-3 Cable Rd were informed that they needed sewer permits for the work they were doing.
