1) New Beach Sticker rules - only two per household. Click Here

2) Town applies \$1.9M from the \$4M un-assigned Fund Balance, the most ever, to keep tax rate flat at \$10.22. <u>Press Release</u> What are the different balances, <u>see example from Hollis</u>, many towns have this statement.

1) Rye Water District infrastructure is not adequate to support developments.

2) In Rye Water District 12 users consume 20% of the water. A few own multiple properties.

3) It is not the number of wells as Aquarion, Rye Water District and private wells are all pulling water from the same aquifer.

4) Discussion of population Rye Water can support with development and ADU. As it is a rate, irrigation and weather are the largest variables. Editor question: *Is there a point when residents can't water gardens because of residential growth?*

5) Aquarion does not have a Franchise to sell water on this part of Rt. 1, the State needs to approve of this expansion.

6) Water Treatment plants and more water equipment requires a larger workforce.

7) For approved developments, 1244 Washington, Airfield Drive, town/RWD can not now charge impact fees for the additional burden on the water infrastructure. There still may be an option for fees

8) Select Board member says the town has been remiss for not getting in front of these issues five years ago. *Editors Note: What are the 2027 issues we are not addressing now?*

9) Cedar Well will not be replaced because the water there needs to be treated.

2) Resident informs board that over a decade ago N. Hampton Forever initiative bought land to prevent dense developments as at the time a home with two children would need to be assessed at over \$650K for taxes to cover incremental town services.

3) Select Board refuses to change Town employee holiday name from Columbus Day to Indigenous People day.

4) Discussed with the Budget Committee Chair on the Committee's concerns on adding another employee. Select Board made it clear staff can be added without going to Town Meeting.


