January 2021 Highlights

- 1) Budget Committee does not approve \$20,000 for Long Range Planning. The \$20K was to be used to have help from consultants in completing the Master Plan Visioning framework and chapter. Board members were unimpressed with the visioning survey and cited a lack of clarity on how the funds will be used as well as limited information shared with the public to date.
- 2) 80% of tests for fecal contamination are above the State threshold in the 2021 Parson's Creek Watershed (page with data Click Here). Report states that fecal matter is coming from the groundwater. See table of 2016 Select Board Committee and FB Engineering recommendations. As of 1/12/22 586 of the 634 properties (92%) in the Parson's Creek Watershed have complied with the Septic System Pumpout ordinance. 48 owners not compliant have been notified. October 2020 State Shoreland Septic System report. Click Here

Members stated that they were not impressed with the Survey that was produced by the Long Range Planning Committee. Members indicated the lack of results and information provided to the public, is creating doubts.
- 4) Resident Steven Borne, who has been attending these Budget Public Hearing sessions for many years, indicated that he is unsure of their value or the intended purpose. At past Budget Committee Public Hearings it was discussed that this requirement left over from when we had a "Town Meeting" only. It may not be relevant now that Rye is an SB2 town (Deliberative meeting, then an official ballot in March). Borne stated that this Public Hearing is too late in the process for the public to have meaningful dialog or to have an impact on the Budget.
