February 2022 Highlights

- 1) Approximately 56 Rye residents attended the Town Deliberative Session, so just under99% of Rye voters <u>did not</u> participate. There were approximately 56 residents in attendance. One resident, not required to be there, attended the School Deliberative meeting in person.
- **2)** TAP Grant for Rye Town Center sidewalk and street improvements are listed 10th, with the top 13 projects expected to be awarded funding in December.
- **3)** Planning Board is now advocating a theme based Master Plan rewrite with a September 2024 completion goal. More detail below.
- 4) Dyana Martin was announced as the new Recreation Director.
- **5)** Planning Board approval included a total of 99 conditions (17 pages) for the two major Rt. 1 developments. **30 Units (former Hectors)** and the **78 additioanl assisted living beds.** RWD is purchasing an Aquarion Water Main to support these developments. Feb. 15th Select Board work session (**video**) discussed water usage impact to Rye and the challenges of getting a Rt. 1 Sewer connection with Portsmouth.
- 6) In two months ZBA has approved 16 variances for Wetlands and Wetland buffers Click Here

- **7)** Many residents expressed concern to the Select Board about the proposed Pease Air Cargo expansion. PDA Public Meeting on March 17th, 8:00am 55 International Drive. Click Here
- **8)** DOT discussed 0.3 miles of Rail Trail that will be in Rye. see image Full presentation not made available electronically.
- **9)** Select Board member defends Dog Waste baralls and DPW deploys improved solution. <u>Click Here</u> At February 8th Select Board work session, Selectman King strongly argued that Rye needs to move to more electronic information for the Building Department to improve the process and reduce costs.
- **10)** No Boards or Commissions are actively discussing the December 2021 Parson's Creek report that says fecal contamination is coming from the ground water. <u>Full Report</u>. <u>Table of recomended actions</u> starting with the 2016 Parsons Creek committee.
- **11)** Seect Board has lifted the mask requirement for town municipal buildings. The Schools had previously announced March 21st as when masks would no longer be required.


