June 2022 Highlights

Highlights Video (history note)

- **1)** Rye Police Chief Kevin Walsh has been made the temporary Town Administrator, while Becky Bergeron will move back to Finance Director (from Town Administrator). <u>Town Announcement</u>
- **2)** Select Board believes they will have a contract to begin Town Hall Extension work by the end of July. Budget Committee approved \$650K spend (Trolley barn funds and the ARPA money). Nothing published so best to watch June 8th <u>Select Board video</u> and <u>June 15th meeting</u> with Budget/Energy Committees
- 3) Two Rye Beach closures so far this summer for<u>fecal contamination</u>. See <u>Jenness beach results</u>. Sew <u>Wallis Rd. Extension Results</u>. No discussion of past<u>recommended actions</u>. \$100K NHDES grant was approved for data base update and DNA testing, note <u>FB Engineering (page 6)</u> says leachfields are likely the primary source of fecal contamination.
- **4)** Portsmouth met with Select Board and Sewer Commission to reset on the options/process for possibly providing Sewer on Rt. 1. <u>Portsmouth Presentation</u>. <u>Recorded video.</u>
- 5) The twenty-four Land Use Regulation amendments being discussed are not available for the public. nor is the Master Plan update that was read at the Planning Board Meeting. The summary from the Visioning sessions last Fall has been reposted. Click Here. Editors Note: There has yet to be a dedicated public discussion about key points from the visioning work and the current strategy to get to a new Master Plan in 2025.
- 6) Of the 79 Zoning Board Variances YTD, Dimension requirements overtook Wetlands Click Here
- 7) Rye letter to NH DES about Coakley Landfill generated by Mindi Messner signed by the Select Board. Click Here
- **8)** After 2023 the DPW will not plow the schools and the School Board will need to find and manage a contractor to do this.
- 9) Handicap placards can be used for Rye Beach Permit parking.

Select Board Meeting June 30th Portsmouth/Sewer Rt. 1 meeeting

Draft Meeting Minutes: Not available

- **1)** Portsmouth DPW and Engineering Department met with Select Board and Rye Sewer to discuss the process for Portsmouth to extend sewer into Rye. <u>Presentation</u>
- 2) Pumping stations and capacity is crucial part of the evaluation, then comes if the lines are under-sized or not. If so, current line goes through prime wetlands and moving to Lafayette Rd would also be expensive. There will also be complications with connections to existing sump-pumps.
- 3) Two complications are Infiltration and inflow. **Infiltration** occurs when groundwater seeps into sewer pipes through cracks, leaky pipe joints and/or deteriorated manholes. **Inflow** is stormwater that enters the sewer system through rain leaders, basement sump pumps or foundation drains typically illegally connected to the sewer.
- **4)** Similar to Greenland, if Rye/Portsmouth could generate an inter-municipal agreement would help, but the question is how much engineering work must be done first.

- 1) Eversource is increasing rates from \$10.60 to \$22.90, Direct Energy is a less expensive power source option. The Town is making this change and residents can do the same. Click Here More Details. Note the Community Power process may not be complete until this time next year.
- **2)** Discussion of the Regional Association Submittal Process discussed, with the letter and this process should be "digitized" instead of paper forms and books that are copied and distributed.
- 3) Resident asking for beach parking sticker as they no longer can drive or have a car. An option is to use personal handicap sticker on the car that brings them to the beach. Handicap vehicles can park in Rye Beach Permit areas.
- **4)** Town Clerk assistant moved, so the Select Board approved an increase in the part time person to 32 hours, but details remain to be worked out with the employee as the current employment agreement letter will need to change.
- **5)** MS4 (water management plans) have been updated. There are multi-step process. Current information can be found <u>Click Here</u>
- **6)** Town is having difficulties getting contractors to respond to the Town Hall boiler replacement. Town has yet to make the insulation and other Town Hall improvements so less oil is used, electric space heaters continue to be used. Geothermal system was sized with the assumption the town would make those improvements.
- 7) Rye Town Center Committee (RTCC) Tap grant is not yet signed off. This \$1M spend will be done by the Town and that cost submitted to the Grant program and these will be reimbursed at 80%. State has a shortage of Program Managers to manage these projects and where the "program management" will come from is unclear. The RTCC would like a work session with the Select Board to rewrite the charter.
- **8)** Town expects to have the Town Hall Annex contract may be finalized and work to start by the end of the month. No commitment to communicate the full plans to residents before work starts.
- **9)** Discussion of 2005 guidance about minimizing road width to slow traffic, information was new to the new DPW and he did not know about the previous Bike Safety information provided to the Town.

- 10) For Rye 400, the HDC would like to have some form of commemorative monument.
- 11) Selectmen King advocating addressing more of the "low hanging" fruit for digitalization, and not wait for a "grand plan". Town Administration will meet with another town later in July to learn about what they did.
- **12)** Suggested that the town's attorney not send out the Parson's Creek Septic Pump out letters and to have the Building Inspector send them out. In public comment, resident continued to suggest the Town look at the <u>four years of FB Engineering suggestions for Parson's Creek</u>. The \$100K grant for the data base and DNA testing has been signed off by the State.
- **13)** Rules and Regulation is looking at an Irrigation Ordinance and this needs to be down in conjunction with Rye Water. Master Plan group is looking for mid September to get information to the CIP, for a 2023 Warrant and a 2025 Master Plan completion.
- **14)** Chief Walsh is not recommending approving the Hungry Lobster to be allowed to expand hours, this will go to the Planning Board on July 12th

Draft Meeting minutes; Not available

- 1) There was only one bidder for the Town Hall extension project. Concern of Safety Building problems.
- **2)** Discussions of total costs of the project for what we are getting. Editors note: \$700K land, \$622K Phase 1, demolition, \$100K legal.... This does not include the Town Hall renovation cost.
- 3) Discussion of doing all three phases at once, tear down the building and do it all at once, versus three separate projects with overhead costs.
- **4)** Select Board positioned as this last option (3 separate projects) is what they can do and that something finally needs to happen to improve town employee working conditions.
- 5) Phase 2 and Phase 3 could be disruptive to employees if the Town gets to that point
- **6)** \$655K can be available using the ARPA funds and the remaining Trolley barn sale. ARPA funds are being used under the "revenue" loss category to use them for Town Hall. Budget Committee approved spending up to this amount.

- **1)** Announced that current Town Administrator will move back the her original Town position of Finance Director and that Police Chief Walsh will be the temporary Town Administrator. <u>Click Here</u>
- 2) Resident advocated that the Town should use this opportunity to look at the current Town management structure and consider a Town Manager with Planning/Leadership skills for all of the Town challenge and projects.
- 3) Resident pointed out that the May 9th meeting ignored the current <u>FB Engineering</u> findings that Parson's Creek fecal contamination is most likely coming from leach fields. Editor's Note: The town has yet to have a discussion about implementation of the many years of recommended actions. <u>Click Here</u>
- 3) Regional Association Review Committee reported on what they have learned and made suggestions for improving the process. Of the 21 Rye 2022 donations, the committee had questions raised by the committee
- 4) Shark Monitor buoys will soon be visible from the beach. Note they only track tagged sharks.
- 5) Hazard Mitigation Plan was approved. Click Here
- **6)** Discussion of proposed Rockingham Planning Commission projects Select Board are focused on North Rd/Lafayette Rd intersection in N. Hampton. Dow Lane/Lafayette Rd was also discussed.
- 7) Select Board discussed priorities, Town Hall annex, digitalization, cell service, Parson's Creek were discussed.

8) Residents near Port Way Cell Tower have been having trespassing concerns, Select Board will have a site-walk.

- 1) Price to complete this phase of the work is \$567K, plus around \$20K for the waterline. With all issues, cost will be \$622K for initial work (post demolition).
- **2)** A water line will need to be run into the building. Material availability is a challenge, but ideal time for construction is prior to the RJH being in session.
- **3)** Funding discussion is to use the \$250K remaining from the Trolley Barn. Government American Recovery Act funds of \$572K was for Sewer, RWD Tower Painting and Perkins Rd. Culvert. Town is looking to only fund the Sewer work and use the balance for Town Hall Annex.
- **4)** Discussion of Town Hall boiler work and the current Geo-thermal system as the Energy Committee would like to see that for Town Hall Annex.



- 1) Water usage has climbed over the 5-year period. With usage increasing ~1.5 million gallons on a monthly basis from this time last year.
- 2) A system leak survey will be started in June through NH DES and covered through a grant awarded to the District.
- 3) Aquarion is abandoning the water main located on Route 1, near the location of the new development at the old Hector's site. There was a discussion about what the procedure would be for the District to take over ownership of the pipe.
- **4)** District discussing need for building permits for installation/replacement of irrigation systems, which would first need to be added to the ordinances.

- 1) City of Portsmouth Engineer made presentation to Select Board and Sewer Commission regarding Rt 1 sewer. <u>Presentation</u>. <u>Video</u> see Select Board notes above
- **2)** Wright-Pierce Pump Station Assessment Report was reviewed and 1 St line of business is to develop a request to repair/replace Abenaqui Pump Station
- **3)** Flow summary for Church Road Pump station in May was 2.7 million gallons similar to 2.8 million in 2021.
- **4)** Sewer Charges and Fees effective Jul1-Sep30 2022 are front footage \$247.17/ft and O.M.R. (Operating & Maintenance) Charge \$0.09/cubic ft of water consumption.
- **5)** 155 Cable Rd (plans previously approved) connection fee of \$41,125,50 based on 150 feet of frontage was communicated to owner.
- 6) Sewer plans and reconnection of 22 Jenness Ave was approved
- 7) Sewer permit application for 25 Sagamore Rd to connect to City of Portsmouth Sewer System was approved (S. Labrie abstained)
- 8) CIP Submission for 2023-2028 is due 15Jul.

- 1) Consultant Julie LaBranche who has provided a contract (\$2,940) to assist LRP Committee and Planning Zoning Administrator in drafting an RPF for a complete update of the MP, was in attendance providing guidance.
- 2) Chair of the PB, Pat Losik, created an 11 page spreadsheet document (emailed to the members) to help with the present task of the Committee. Note: Not included with the draft meeting minutes.
- **3)** Consultant Julie LaBranche has tweaked the original contract and there was discussion to extend services until December 31st (versus October 31st) so that Julie LaBranche could attend both budget presentations (Select Board and BC in the Fall) to assist Planning and Zoning Administrator in requesting funding for a complete update of the MP.
- 4) Plan is to have a draft of the RFP by September so that it can be reviewed by PB members and then presented to Select Board and BC during budget presentations.
- **5)** Once the funding has been approved by Select Board/BC, the next step would be to solicit requests from Planning Consulting firms.
- 6) Discussion about including funding for implementation, built-out analysis, etc...
- 7) Julie LaBranche is going to compile an inventory of communities (similar size) that have recently updated their MP with cost associated and how they went about doing it (firms...)
- 8) Committee members (3) need to decide what kind of MP they want.
- 9) The completion of the complete MP update is now projected for early 2025 (from 2024).
- 10) Members discussed the fact that the survey results (community and municipal) had been posted on the Town of Rye website and that they should be removed. According to PB Chair, Pat Losik, they contain "personal information" and the Committee needs to figure out how to redact the content and then post the results again. Planning and Zoning Administrator removed the results (post meeting) as discussed.

Editor's notes: the survey results (community and municipal) were posted briefly on the Town of Rye website (6/3) and were removed post June 7th meeting. It is unclear what constitutes "personal information" and how much content will be redacted, how and when. The survey results have not been analyzed within the context of the Visioning outreach. The Committee is making important decisions, such as "what kind of MP they want" as a very small group.

- 1) Several members of the public were in attendance in addition to Art Ditto from the Rye Water District (RWD).
- **2)** Attorney Michael Donovan was in attendance via ZOOM to review amendments made to the Land Development Regulations (LDR).
- **3)** Members of the Committee (2 present) made several motions to move amendments to the LDR to the July 12th Planning Board meeting so that they can be reviewed by members of the Planning Board in order to schedule a public hearing.
- **4)** # 1 through # 24 amendments were reviewed in NPS (May meetings) and moved by enumerating each amendment by its number only to the July 12th PB meeting.
- 5) New amendments were discussed relating to preservation of natural environment, irrigation, stormwater plan for 100 years storm, exemption for less than 100 square feet of development, and requiring stormwater management for minor site development.
- 6) Art Ditto from RWD provided a draft/request for a Rye Zoning Ordinance to regulate irrigation in the Rye Water District.
- 7) A complete rewrite of the Rye Zoning Ordinance (RZ0) is in the work with Attorney Eric Maher doing the review (possibly by August for discussion).
- **8)** A member of the public asked why amendments 1 through 24 had been discussed in NPS. It was stated that they were "current cases" and there could be ramifications.

Editor's notes: both the LDR and RZO are being reviewed and revised. In each instance, the R&R members (2-3) along with the Planning and Zoning Administrator, discussed the scope of the revisions in Non Public Session with an Attorney present via Zoom. As stated by the Chair of R&R Steve Carter, the reasons for "going over the LDR" are twofold: 1) to correct errors and omissions made when the LDR was updated (2020) and 2) to make changes to the LDR (close to 30 amendments) to "tighten things down." Attorney Michael Donovan has worked with the R&R members in several NPS to review the changes to the LDR. None of the amendments 1 through 24 have been discussed publicly.


