August 2022 Highlights

WATCH Highlights Video (& history note)

- 1) Matt Scruton, the current Greenland Town Administrator will be the new Rye Town Administrator starting next month. <u>Click Here</u> for the Select Board announcement and <u>here</u> for his LinkedIn profile. Sixteen people applied, four were invited to interview and three went through detailed interviews.
- 2) Did you suffer any angst over the past decade? Cell coverage, Town Hall, Development, How Rye is changing? A well thought out and comprehensive master plan can help Rye avoid repeating the issues of the past decade. The Planning Board will be asking for \$95K to \$145K to develop a new Master Plan. To help assure the Master Plan reflects a consensus from residents, a diverse and talented set of residents are needed to step up to be on the Master Plan Steering committee. <u>E-mail if</u> you are interested in this crucial activity.
- **3) WATER!** Rye Water District is looking for places to locate more wells. Some of these locations are on Conservation Land, On Sept. 15th, Rye Water District, Select Board, Rye Conservation Commission are meeting about additional wells on conservation lands at 7:30pm at the RJH. Agenda not posted yet. A \$10M+ water treatment plant may be required as NH DES manganese and PFOA standards are changing. This meeting will be preceded at 6pm by the presentation on "Why Healthy Marshes Matter" by David Burdick, in the Library. More Information.
- **4) WATER!** Update on the Coakley Landfill from representatives of DES, EPA and Coakley landfill group show no progress has been made in remediating the site. Updated guidance states that essentially no level of PFAS is acceptable in drinking water. Slides <u>presented</u> are in draft <u>Select Board minutes</u> and presentation is on the <u>video</u>. See summary below (8-8 Select Board or full<u>meeting minutes</u>)
- **5) WATER!** RWD reports pumping totals continue to climb monthly and on a yearly basis. RWD said there is not sufficient capacity for the Rt. 1 major developments, leading the Planning Board to question whether any new developments can be approved in the RWD. <u>Click Here</u> (Communication Section of Planning Board minutes)
- 6) WATER! Are you following the mandatory Lawn Watering and Irrigation Directive? Click Here
- 7) Harbor Road Bridge is falling apart. Initial inspection revealed accelerated deterioration and action will need to be taken soon. Click Here (Starts around 39 minutes in video)
- **8)** Time to get involved? There are many <u>Alternate and Member vacancies</u> for the Town's appointed committees and commissions.
- **9)** Now is the time to participate in the 2023 \$25M+ Town/School budget discussions. Waiting until the public hearings on the Town/School budget (Jan 11 and 12, 2023) does not provide much time for public comment with the final budget is due to the Select Board on Jan 26, 2023. 10) The Town Attorney has been rewriting the Rye Zoning Ordinances since Spring. There has been no public discussion or update. So it is not clear why a non-public meeting Sept. 6th under consult with counsel is needed or occurring. Year to Date there have been 111 Variances granted, led by dimensions, wetlands/wetlands buffer and non-conforming buildings.

- 2) Rye will continue to fund the lobbyist working to prevent the return of "donor towns" for funding other NH schools.
- 3) Town Deliberative meeting will be on February 4th with a snow date of February 11th.
- 4) Town Hall annex construction work may be completed shortly after Thanksgiving.
- 5) Harbor Rd Bridge is falling apart. Initial inspection revealed accelerated deterioration and action will need to be taken soon. DPW Director was informed of the situation the day of the meeting and more information is needed, but significant repairs will be needed soon. There may also be load restrictions
- 6) A gravel pit at 90 Locke Rd is on a 17 acre parcel that the Town of Rye has an easement to use as a gravel pit. Owners are asking Rye to relinquish the town's ability to access/use the gravel pit.
- 7) It does not make sense to repair the sidewalk along Ocean Blvd until the State repairs the seawall.



- 4) RWD is looking at changing the rate structure for 2023.

1) There had been some confusion coming out of the last LRP meeting, where Julie LaBranche had thought drafting of RFP had been put on hold until a Steering Committee is assembled. Discussion to

go ahead with drafting the RFP with the assistance of Julie LaBranche. Members reviewed the current RFP draft.

- 2) Julie LaBranche's contract ends on October 31st, however, the contract includes a budget item and provision for Julie LaBranche to assist Planning and Zoning Administrator, Kim Reed, when submitting her budget for a Master Plan update/build-out analysis to the Select Board and Budget Committee in November/December.
- 3) Determine process for Steering Committee member selection." The "process" has been "to recommend names of people to the Planning Board." Chair Wright has created a spreadsheet with names of people and which has been submitted to the members of the LRP. The list will be given to the Planning Board members on August 9th for their consideration.

Editor's Note: the "process" of selecting members for the Master Plan Steering Committee has been limited to LRP members reaching out to Planning Board members to recommend names "among people they know" There has been no outreach to the public at large and to members from other Town boards and no announcement to date on the Town of Rye website. The "list" of people at the August 9th meeting who have volunteered was not announced publicly. It appears that planning board members will have a majority representation with 4 members.

- 1) Monitoring sub-divisions. In an effort to monitor all of the conditions sub-divisions must continually meet, there will be site walks at 1244 Washington Rd, Goss Farm and Stoneleigh (South Rd development that the town had to pay to settle with). The site walks are the last step before a certification of completion is issued. The new Land Use Administrator is starting with a list of all sub-divisions since 2006. The goal is to develop a tracking system.

Editor's Notes: Attorney Maher has been working on a "complete rewrite of the RZO" since the Spring as indicated by Planning and Zoning Administrator, Kim Reed. However, the scope of the rewrite has not been made available to the public. Additionally, there were no scheduled meetings in July and August and the upcoming meeting on September 6th is a "NON-PUBLIC SESSION (1) PER RSA 91-A:3 (consult with counsel)." The public has not been invited to participate in this "re-write" of the RZO and/or even to provide comments.

- 1) Community Power Update: With Select Board approval, CPCNH Board is now able to amend the Joint Powers Agreement at any meetings, instead of only annually.
- 2) Modifications to the Energy Aggregate Plan (EAP) were presented to the Select Board on Jul 25th. No changes were made to the intent of the plan, appendices added that explain technical details of how Load Serving Entities will work. Request for Select Board to proceed with legal review.
- 3) Public Utilities Commission releases rules for Community Power on Jul 27th and no changes to EAP expected. Rules will go to Joint Legislative Commission on Administration Rules for hearing, likely Aug 18th
- **4)** Rye's participation in the Home Performance with Energy Star (HPwES) is limited. The program is for existing homes and cost savings apply to efficiency measures. HPwES is not income based, good candidates might be older homes or those ready to replace less efficient appliances. In addition, there are income based incentives through Home Energy Assistance (HEA)
- 5) Rye Energy will be at the Sept 18th Rye Auto Show and will have information of weatherization, community power, and possible Button UP workshop and an EV vehicle or two.
- **6)** Working hard to let residents know that Direct Energy is still lower than Eversource, but Direct Energy also recently raised their price. <u>Click Here to learn about changing rates.</u> <u>Compare Electric Energy rates.</u>

- 1) It was noted that David Burdick, Associate Professor at U.N.H Department of Natural Resources, will be giving a presentation on 'Why Healthy Tidal Marshes Matter' on <u>September 15th, 6:30 p.m.</u> at the Rye Public Library. **Editor's note:** time changed to 6 pm
- **2)** It was pointed out that Mike Morrison from Swamp, Inc. focuses on marsh management in the yearly bid for mosquito control for Rye. Mike believes towns should be doing more marsh management, which would reduce the need for larviciding and associated tasks.
- 3) Dragon's work with greenhead traps seems to be consistent with previous years. A few traps were moved closer to 175 Harbor Drive to accommodate a resident's request. It was suggested that there be an evaluation of traps and their location.
- **4)** Spraying at Parsons Field and the recreation area was approved, pending the process that Dragon follows to notify the schools and recreation department.
