- 1) Rye Recycling will accept funds from the NH the Beautiful 2022 for engaging residents.
- **2)** Discussions about all of the work associated with the ocean storm damage to the Ocean Blvd. shale plies. Work was completed in conjunction with the State. <u>Ocean Blvd.</u>
- 2) Legal costs will put Conservation Commission \$20K over budget and funds need to be sifted to pay these legal bills.
- **3)** After a a Public Hearing, Select Board want to allow three (3) beach stickers per living unit (home, apartment, condo...) and increase the fee to \$30 each. The 2023 stickers will be "commemorative stickers, design revealing will be soon.
- 4) Conservation will be funding the land surveying on Rye Recreation property.
- 5) Select Board requests more information on Rye Recreation plans to purchasing a small van as it has been expensive renting large buses and will create additional program options. Other Rye departments could use the van.

- 2) Rye Lions announced and presented Chief Walsh with recognition for being named a NH Granite State Fellow.
- 3) Select Board chooses to not discuss resident <u>letter</u> that called out the town for <u>spending over \$2800</u> the legal notice for the Zoning Ordinance public hearing.
- 4) Dan Fuglestad sworn in as a Police Sergeant.
- **5)** Select Board and DPW Director are supportive of the presented business plan for a new Trash & Recycling Pick-up proposal that will be for Rye residents and utilize the Rye Transfer Station.
- **6)** Community Power Purchasing is moving forward. Eversource customers would be automatically optioned-in, those who use other electricity providers will need to opt-out of them and then opt-in. There will be more education and communication this winter before the program starts. More Information
- **7)** Chief Police discussed how Rye has prepared for a school lockdown as PHS and other towns had a false alarm the past week.
- 8) Town Hall annex could have people begin to move locations before the end of the year.
- **9)** The Rye Town Center Committee now has two charges, one for the main committee and another for a new smaller and more technical group to oversee the TAP grant funding and implementation. Interested residents should contact the Select Board.
- 10) In addition to the building and grounds person, the DPW Custodian may be retiring, so the DPW

budget includes funds for the increased cost of contracting.

11) DPW Director proposed to not hire the requested new person and part-time administrator until the Fall to defer the costs. Select Board suggested that for the small savings the town would be better served to have the new Highway person start this Summer, when the DPW staff takes vacations and when road work is getting completed. Note, the DPW encourages employees to not take vacations in the winter so they are fully staffed for potential snow storms.

12) It was discovered the the town is not clear on when the payments should have started for the Port Way Cell tower, as the second carrier to be operational is making payments, but Verizon may not have started making payments.

- **4)** The new RES and RJH are increasing coordination to maximize how prepared RES students are for RJH and for a smooth and continuous learning path.
- **5)** Warrant Article: Proposed change to final year of Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) for Educational Support Personnel to address pay disparities, staff attrition and recruiting challenges. Warrant article would result in a \$131,408 cost increase in the 2023/24 budget.
- **6)** Warrant article: \$75K will be moved to the Special Education Expendable Trust if there are sufficient funds in the un-assigned fund balance at the end of the fiscal year. This warrant article has no tax impact.
- 7) Warrant article: \$50K will be moved to the Tuition Expendable Trust if there are sufficient funds in the un-assigned fund balance at the end of the fiscal year. This warrant article has no tax impact.

- 1) Wright-Pierce is coordinating with NE Backflow to test the 60 to 70 connections and about 110 devices as part of the Boil Water investigation/process.
- 2) RWD is applying for grant funds to help with the combined treatment plant strategy.
- 3) RWD and Rye Conservation continue to cooperate towards testing for a new well on Conservation property
- 4) Since the Select Board recanted on the Federal Recovery money going to RWD, the water tank painting is moving out to 2024.
- 5) Chlorine is added at the well sites, so the closer you are the stronger the chlorine smell will be. Sediment is also being loosened up as a result of the chlorine. Flushing notice
- 6) At the November 6th RWD/SB meeting, RWD said there would be a future public meeting on PFOAs. Residents in attendance where informed that RWD will first survey customers for what should be discussed at a Public Forum.
- 7) RWD is completing sampling for Arsenic levels since a resident completed private testing that showed elevated levels of arsenic.
- 8) Rye Sewer notified that Adam's Trailer Park water usage doubled during the boil water alert. Cause was unknown at the time.
- 9) Discussion of letter from Mindi Messmer. The process explained appeared to be slightly different then what residents heard on November 6th. RWD does not feel that it would be overall beneficial to be notifying residents each time there is high coliform measured.
- 10) RWD feels the Town Monitor Well 102 at the Grover Rd. Dump should be tested in parallel for when RWD completes sampling at the Grove Rd. Dump.
- 11) RWD is pushing the Planning Department to require Building Permits for Irrigation systems, so RWD, and other suppliers will be able assure installers have the current requirements and water suppliers will be able to build a database of where there are irrigation systems. The water supplier will be responsible for installation inspection, not the Building Department.
- 12) RWD needed to remind the Planning Administrator that RWD stated that they can't support the 80 Unit development proposal on Rt 1/Breakfast Hill Rid (part will be in Greenland). Topic was discussed in depth at a Planning Board meeting.

It contains a description of each of the positions and groups, together with the contact information for each. It provides a road map to assist citizens in interacting with each function. The document is fluid. The intention of the RCL is to revise the Handbook at least annually in response to changes in staff, board and committee memberships, and the laws.
