

- 1) Only about 1 in 5 residents (20%) voted in the Town Election (results) and School Election (results). All warrants passed. Over \$25M+ in government services approved. Early absentee requests did not include the School Ballot, it was provided to those people in a second mailing.
- **2)** Rye Community Power will save residents electricity. Presentation with Q&A, Tuesday, April 4th 6:30pm RJH. <u>Information</u> sent to residents. March 13th<u>presentation video</u>
- **3)** Rye Water District Annual meeting had over 160 people, more than most Town Deliberative meetings as it was the first contested commissioners race, Dr. Rosalie Lapresto is the new commissioner. March 9th RWD Quality of Services <u>Video Presentation PFOA testing</u> shows five years of steady flow of PFOA ratings above the 4ppt soon to be <u>announced EPA regulations</u>.
- **4)** Resident suggests the Select Board investigate getting a second opinion to see if the PFOA at the Grove Rd Dump can be contained from flowing into the Garland Well.
- 5) NH HOP (housing) \$17K grant accepted, RFP issued with three entities responding to the 1 week time line. RFP for the Master Plan Update and Build Out Analysis were also posted. Rye can also send three people to the NH Housing Academy program starting in May, e-mail the Planning Board Admin.
- **6)** Aquarion Water made its Annual Presentation to the Select Board Video starts at 46:00 There will be a rate increase and there was a discussion of PFOA.
- 7) 2021 Adams Park sewage leak into Baily's Brook cause and actions report submitted
- 8) <u>Select Board communicated</u> to the offices of Senator Shaheen and U.S. Rep. Pappas that Rye would like \$10M in Federal Funding for connecting Rt. 1 to Portsmouth/N. Hampton Sewer and water systems. Note: There has not been a public discussion of Rt. 1 development being a higher priority than the fecal contamination in Parsons Creek Watershed or the PFOA in Rye water.
- 9) RES Walk-a-thon raises \$20K toward a new playground. Feel free tomake donations.

Select Board Meeting March 27th

Draft Meeting notes: Not available

- **1)** Residents request and volunteer to help improve how residents can understand permitting and the rules regarding modifying or developing property.
- **2)** Resident suggest Rye get a second opinion on remediating the PFOA contamination at the Grove Rd. Dump. See five years of <u>PFOA data mostly</u> above the recently announced EPA intentions.
- 3) Stephen King stepped down after twenty years on the Rye Recreation Commission.
- **4)** Resident discusses <u>Letter</u> over concerns of not budgeting annual costs for keeping Rye Codes updated online, that the <u>posted PDF</u> (2020 version) is only searchable inside the PDF, full costs of all code changes and updates not clearly communicated and the over \$75K in legal fees spent on Garland Rd.
- **5)** Approved bids for Lawn care (18 greens), Street Sweeping (30 hours) and Road Pavement Markings (just the main lines). Select Board requested the DPW Director to request 3 year agreements.
- **6)** Select Board designated who will be the Select Board Representatives. Note, Select Board did not address resident questions on why some boards and not others have Select Board Representatives.
- **7)** Aquarion Water presented an update. <u>Click Here</u> to see slides, including PFOA results. There is a rate increase for water.
- **8)** Cross connection for Fire Safety backup for Rt. 1 30 unit development being built is not installed, nor is there a timeline. If water is needed in an emergency, Fire Departments will utilize Aquarion hydrants.
- 9) Select Board made it clear they support the letter opposing the Proposed Fuel Farm at Pease, but were not discussing it at this meeting.
- **10)** Recycling Education Committee Charge renewed and moved from 1 year to 3years. A prior Select Board had reduced it to an annual charter.
- **11)** Carriage House farming agreement at Goss Farm was approved. Discussion on what factored into the pricing point. State Grants require RCC to attract and support farming on the property.
- 12) Town is locked into assessing systems and approved the web hosting agreement.
- **13)** Select Board discussion surfaced that an appointed Board, Committee or Commission term that Expires has a re-appointment process. For Vacancies or Open positions, there is a separate process with a 30 day notification window. Room for communication improvements.
- **14)** Town Center TAP grant is moving forward. Rye may move up in the priority list as the town funding portion has been approved. A \$1,016,691.47 project with Rye funding \$203,338.29 and the grant funding the **balance**.
- 15) Regional Charitable donations committee has some questions that need to be resolved.

- 1) Many warm words for retiring Water District Commissioner Art Ditto.
- 2) 156 people voted for a new Rye Water Commissioner. There were more than that number at the meeting (those who lived outside of RWD). Dr. Rosalie Lapresto received 93 votes to Julie Tucker's 63.
- 3) The \$2M budget passed along with the \$60,000 of warrants. Budget increases are for an additional employee, vehicle, site work to merge all water for chlorination and a chlorination system.

- 1) Level of Service results were presented
- **2)** Major work to connect water supplies around the Garland Well Pump house where the chlorine system is located. <u>Click Here</u> for diagram of the work
- **3)** Two year blended PFOA data shows a continues flow of PFOA above the 4ppt guidance the EPA is working to approve. See <u>PFOA data</u>. Most above the EPA guidelines being discussed.
- **4)** Water Treatment for the Iron and Manganese is still estimated to be over \$11M and would be five or more years to operation. Current design is old and does not include treating for PFOA.
- **5)** Demand increases and heavy metal content at the Cedar Run well has Rye running off two wells most times. An additional well is needed and with current discussions for testing locations on the RCC Brown property.



- 1) Accepted the report and proposal for the remedy what led to the sewage discharge at Adams Mobile Home Park that was discovered in Berry's Brook watershed. Click Here
- **2)** Abenaqui Country Club has a project that includes a platform tennis court that includes as warming hut with water. This additional water will flow to the sewer. Rate structure will be researched to determine impact or possible changes.
- **3)** Abenaqui pump station generator and control panel work has started and will be finished before work is started on the other pump stations.
- **4)** While Portsmouth provides the water and sewage at 15 Sagamore Rd, The Sewer Commission is an administrator of the agreement for the Rye/Portsmouth Intermunicipal Agreement, so the State has requested input.
- **5)** Engineering Consulting Services for Wastewater Asset Management Program RFQ responses were reviewed and after scoring Underwood Engineers was selected. The \$30K funding is form the NH-DES

Clean Water State Revolving Fund grant that was accepted by the Select Board in February.

- **6)** 61 Red Mill Rd had changes to locations of sewer connections were to be and a tree was removed that enabled a different path for the sewer line.
- 7) Commissioners received the annual report to review.
- 8) Town Administrator provided a letter from the Rye <u>Select Board asking for \$10M</u> in Federal Funding for a sewer line and water from N. Hampton to Rye and to connect to N. Hampton.
