Extension and Concord Point beach areas to be closed for several days. <u>FB Environmental testing</u> at Concord Point (PC Out) readings were much higher (1281mpn/100mL) than past readings (2021 373 mpn/100mL was a past high in wet conditions). State standard is 104mpn/100mL. The Town has posted <u>these signs on</u> Wallis Rd and at Concord Point.

1) Resident reviews proposal previously provided to the Select Board for a Rye 400 Monument that would recognize the first settler and first group of Rye families.

2) Long discussion of the <u>Gulf of Maine Intergovernmental Renewable Energy task force</u> and who will replace Phil Winslow representing Rye. Of the three people being considered to represent Rye, the Select Board appointed former State Senator Tom Sherman who was involved with this group as a legislator. Sherman agreed to communicate with the other two candidates that both brought additional and valuable perspectives.

4) Discussed revenue update, but there are some clarifications needed before it could be made available to the public.

5) Residents proposed residents, Mel Lowe, Jane Ireland, Alex Herlihy and the late Peter Crawford, to be honored by having the Town Hall Annex named for them. After public comment and discussions, Mel and Jeanne Low were selected.

6) While NH DES no longer has a fecal contamination warning for the beach by Concord Pt. FB Environmental testing at PC Out (<u>see diagram</u>) is at 1282 mpn/100mL, where previous wet readings had a high of 373 mpn/100mL in 2021. Rye is posting warning signs until these numbers drop. NH State standard for coastal beaches is 104mpn/100mL. <u>Click Here</u>

7) The status of the Septic Pump Out ordinance results is being tracked and used to communicate to locations that are out of compliance or of concern. <u>Click Here for the most current report</u>. 2) Forty-one (41) homes were tested for lead and copper. Lead was only detected at two homes, with one being above the safety level. That same home also had a high copper reading.

3) Point of Entry work at the Garland Well location is progressing with the chlorination machine running, operation should begin in a few weeks.

4) Fairhill/Ocean Blvd area has had leaks from wear and tear as the area is wet and boggy.

2) There have been 6 inquiries about membership and 4 strong candidates. Committee voted to have an email list of interested people and email them about Beach Committee events. Committee agreed to recommend the Select Board appoint Tom Mack as a member and Doug Beattie and Mike Hammond as alternates.

3) Selectman Epperson wrote Chair Sullivan with concerns about F Street Beach access. One homeowner has planted seagrass which may be limiting the access. Selectman King noted the Select Board directed the DPW Director to contact the owner about removing the sea grass. It was noted that it's important to respect the rights of property owners and access points. It was suggested that the Beach Committee recommend the town inventory and survey the access points.

4) There have been a lot of meetings where people are upset about speeds on Route 1A. Rye Beach District residents and Rye Civic League are holding a meeting Aug 16, 7:30 at Rye public library.5) Discussion on crosswalks, some not very visible, and one by Surf Club, Kooks, and Pizza Lido's has

not been repainted. Selectman King to speak to DPW director about what can be done. Also noted that it should involve State Representatives as 1A is a state road.
