#### **November Highlights**

- 1) 2023 Tax Rate would have been 23%, not the 15% increase in current tax bills if the Selection Board did not apply \$2M of the un-assigned fund balance to pay down the tax rate. An amount was used so a \$750,000 home would only have a 15% tax increase. Note your December bill is slightly higher than 1/2 your total taxes since your June bill used the 2022 lower tax rate. - 2) Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) was accepted by the Select Board. A link to the Final Draft CIP document is provided in the Civic News. <u>Click Here 2024 Table</u> of all line items. Past project <u>updates</u>
- **3)** As part of the Rye Civic League annual meeting, the Civic League presented "Water in Rye", including an explanation of hydrology, water suppliers, what puts our water at risk and information on the need for a Water Treatment plant in Rye. All residents should want to know and understand this information. Link to video stream. Click Here and here for the Presentation (Note: slides are hard to read in the video).
- **4)** A Rye 400 event was held where Anne Jennison presented on the "Impact of 500 years of colonization on the Abenaki-Wabenaki people of the Northeast". Her talk focused on the history of these Indigenous peoples, the first on the North American continent to interact with and be profoundly impacted by European colonization. Link to video stream provided in Civic News. <u>Click Here</u> Rye 400 Fundraiser provided \$30K for the new RES playground.
- 5) Rye Heritage Commission votes to move forward with restoration of the historic gazebo
- **6)** ZBA approved the Wentworth By The Sea Country Club (WBTSCC) 780' long 2'x3' Stone Retaining wall that the RCC letter points out will have an impact of 1,561 sq. ft. ZBA minutes quote WTBSCC that this is "to protect the property from flooding, to keep golf ball from entering and plugging the salt marsh, and to create a barrier discouraging golfers from entering the highly sensitive area." WTBSCC statement also says the "project proposes a total of 6,094 square feet of permanent and temporary impact on adjacent freshwater wetlands."
- **7)** Not counting warrant articles and capital spend, initial <u>Town Operations budgets</u> are up \$1,049,009 (8.57%) and initial <u>School Budget</u> is up \$645,065 (3.83%). November 9th Select Board discussed over \$320K of Capital Spend (does not include warrant article spend). Town looking to add part-time Building Inspector, making the Animal Control Officer fulltime, additional hours for Police School Resource officer and part-time Finance support. The next Budget Committee meetings are December 6th and 7th.

- 8) Conservation Commission heard plans for demolishing Brits Bits and replacing with a mixed use structure.
- 9) Recreation Commission presented updated Master Plan that includes softball field, replacing modular buildings, tennis/pickleball and more.
- **10)** DPW discussion \$1.4M to replace the town's <u>refueling station</u> that is in the Garland Rd Well (RWD primary well) <u>Wellhead Projection Zone</u>.

### **Select Board Meeting November 27th**

Draft Meeting notes: Not available

- 1) Public Hearing to increase town fees. Police and Fire Details, Dog License fees and Historic District Commission were all approved.
- 2) Recreation Master Plan presentation. Current Master Plan is from 2011. First phase is for a Softball Field and getting new offices and bathrooms built.
- 3) FB Engineering quote to testing Berry's Brook foam for PFAS. Local lab can evaluate, so testing a column of water would be about \$2100. Discussion of NH DES or Coakley to fund and to include in 2024 Budget. State Rep. Grote will communicate with the State groups.
- 4) Beach Public Access 10 year update will be updated with photos by the DPW. Signage and pictures will be included.
- 5) Town Historian role discussed and what other Historians do in other towns. Adding a mentor responsibility for the next Historian, Applications can be submitted, Alex Herlihy has been acting as the Town Historian since the Historical Society began using it.
- 6) Committee discussed about town "Rye Community Engagement Committee", to be discussed at the next Select Board meeting.
- 7) Perkins Rd. Sidewalk is in progress. One section was halted as a safety concern is discussed. Maybe possible to put plantings in the safety zone that don't impact site lines.
- 8) Town investigating temporary locations for the Rye 400 Monument and the Founders monument that is dig safe. There ill be a Public Hearing to accept the gift.
- 9) TAP Grant is working with the firm on final scope and fee for the work. The committee must conduct business as a public body which is cumbersome. The committee will disband so that the Town Administrator and DPW director can lead the efforts.
- 10) There is a Rye Recreation donation fund with \$6K that the Town is unclear what is for and what it can be used for. Select Board will put the Recreation Design work including to replace modular units and bathrooms (\$75K) and vehicle (\$40K) to be capital outlays and the \$75K for the softball field to be a warrant article.
- 11) Conservation requesting the survey work of Town Forest work that did not complete in 2023 for \$4050. If there is a 2023 contract in place those funds can be incmbered. The "0" Pioneer work will not be under contract by year end, so this \$42K will be needed in 2024.
- 12) Perpetual warrant articles were discussed and approved. \$200K for DPW equipment. \$200K for Fire & Ambulance fund.

- 1) Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) was presented to Select Board. Click Here. While State RSA requires it to be discussed in a Public Hearing, the document was not available to the public before or during the Public Hearing. Summary Table Update on 2023 projects
- **2)** CIP contains a wealth of information worth reading and has new 2023 project summary table and 2024 Plan summary table Click Here Top 2024 items are DPW \$3.35M, RWD \$1.6M, School \$653K, Town Buildings \$334K
- 3) Tax Rate setting meeting. Select Board decided that a fair tax increase would be 15%, not the 23% it would be if \$1,827,336 was not used from the un-assigned account balance to pay down the tax rate. Town Tax rate will be 8.03%, with RWD at 0.54, JBVD at 0.15 and RBVD at 0.29. NH DRA must first approve this.
- 4) From November 2022 to November 2023 the un-assigned fund balance increased by over \$1.5M.
- 5) Discussion of the <u>Transfer station re-fueling system</u> could cost \$1.4M in 2024 to be replaced, It is not leaking but is no longer supportable. Note: The Transfer Station is in the Garland Well (primary well) <u>Aquifer protection area.</u>
- 6) Engineering firm for the TAP Grant was approved, to help the Rye Town Center changes planned.
- **7)** The Telecom Infrastructure Committee members and charge were approved along with \$1500 to get the coverage maps updated.
- **8)** Residents promoting the "Founders Monument" are removing the Indigenous People and Land Acknowledgement from the back side. Monuments can't be made permanent until the TAP grant is finalized.
- 9) Town is looking at installing a dedicated hub and spoke Fiber Optic network for cybersecurity.

## Select Board Meeting November 9th Capital Spending Review

- **1)** Police Dept. is looking to update the 2006 building Video recording system in a phased approach and only replacing what needs to be. \$90K
- **2)** Recreation Building designs to replace modulars, bathrooms and space for 2025 construction. Master Plan came after the due dates for CIP, but moving offices is the first step.
- 3) Lighting and safety for Recreation was discussed
- **4)** Replacing the Transfers Station Grove Rd. fence. Select Board advocates for installing something that will last as long as possible.
- **5)** Funding paving condition video survey of roads (\$25K). Has been completed twice before. Produces a paving condition index. Select Board would like to see some public education around this.
- 6) Perkins Rd./1A intersection safety modifications, paving, painting and signs. \$5,500
- **7)** MS4 Reporting and Tasks \$40K and suggests a Capital Reserve Fund (start with \$25K) as regulations are most likely to increase.
- 8) Sawyers Beach seawall maintenance 10 year wetlands permit extension engineering work. \$7K
- **9)** Paving Hotbox for using real asphalt to repair roads and not temporary cold patches. \$50K (demonstration unit). Can only be used when asphalt plants are open (not the winter). \$35K was spent on South Rd. repairs this past year.
- **10)** Town is pushing to replace laptops every three years, moving away from Desktops PCs and moving Trust Fund computer and software off of MS-DOS. Adding an additional server. Ten new systems. Town owns fifty to sixty PCs. \$35,280
- 11) Discussion of Town Hall Annex shutters.

- 1) Board approves (5-0) FY25 Budget of \$17,854,947 which is a 3.76% increase over last year.
- **2)** Board approves (5-0) new 3-year collective bargaining agreement with Rye Educational Support Personnel Association (RESPA). The total increase over the 3-year period is just over \$223K.



- 1) Vendor presented utility rate management software.
- 2) Fall flushing was completed with a minimal of brown water complaints.
- 3) Winterizing Hydrants and inspections is the next set of maintenance tasks. Also backflow testing and lead and copper samples. E. Coli testing was also completed with all negative results.
- 4) Several leaks were identified and repaired. 973 Ocean Blvd was called out.
- 5) CIP questioned the Water Treatment funding strategy and it is not determined at this time.
- 6) Aquarion letter to Select Board was reviewed and assumptions of numbers were questioned. Example is Aquarion not including the Hydrant costs.
- 7) The Select Board have sent a letter to RWD about the Water Treatment Funding.

- 1) Photos of Sewer service connections at 22 Richard Rd and 6 Richard Rd were reviewed. Sewer service at 89 Cable Rd was capped in preparation for demolition.

- 3) The building permits for new roofs at all three pump stations were issued on October 31, 2023
- 4) The warrant for collection of Sewer Operation and Maintenance Cost from Adams Mobile Home Park was signed, dated 14Nov23 and indicated \$15,091.77 to be collected.

- 1) The Community Power Coalition of NH (CPCNH) is required to provide monthly reports to its Members. A draft of this report was shared, which shows the total revenues, costs, savings, and community benefit for CPCNH and each of the operating Community Power programs.
- 2) Net metering was discussed, where customers receive credit from utilities for the excess generation that their solar array produces. CPCNH is working to "see" the excess generation so that they can properly credit customers. Rye Energy Committee will request that CPCNH provides a webinar about this topic so that more people can understand more about net metering.
- **3)** The School Board approved the updated Power Purchase Agreement for the solar installation on Rye Elementary School. The price of panels has come down by 7% and the panels have been upgraded from 405 kW to 450 kW since the original proposal.
