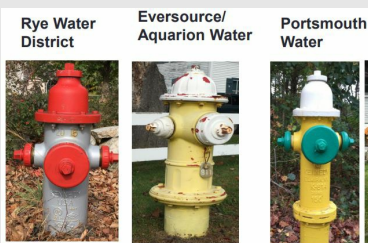

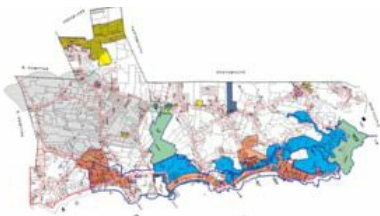

- 1) Update on Community Power. New rates approved for Aug 1, 2024- Jan 31 2025 with Granite Basic being 8.6 cents/kWh), compared to 10.403 cents/kWh with Eversource. ([Click Here](#))
- 2) Over the past 12 months, Rye Community Power has saved its customers \$429,000 over Eversource default supply rates and has supplied Rye customers with 21,347 MWh of power.

- 1) Discussed macro financial environment. Markets remain optimistic that Federal Reserve will cut interest rates later this year.
- 2) Trust Fund account holdings were reviewed.
