
- 1) July saw a 25% increase in water pumped compared to last year.
- 2) Residents have been restricting water usage once the signs were posted.
- 3) Kamstrup meter upgrades are being installed in resident homes.
- 4) Discussed progress of the Central Water Treatment Plant Field Scale Pilot Study with Wright-Pierce.
- **5)** Approved \$5K for Wright-Pierce to submit a NH State Revolving Fund application for the Lead Service Line Inventory projects. If approved the fund will cover 71% of this project.
