January Highlights (video)

1) Here's what you missed if you weren't at the Town Deliberative meeting Recorded Video 9 hours.

Residents enjoyed the opportunity to socialize during the Civic League Sponsored Civic Fest (food donations from Common Roots and Seacoast Soups) despite the Select Board request to push through with no lunch break. Note meeting went to 5pm.

Warrant BudgetGreen sheet (2024 Actuals are from 10/31/24 and may still not be updated to that date). MS-737Default Budget

Article 5: Harbor Rd. Bridge, \$975K went from a bond to cash from the un-assigned account balance

Article 6: \$789K went from 100% bond, to using \$230K from the Reserve fund and the balance bonded

Article 7: Tennis Court was not made to study, will stay on the ballot as is

Article 8: Corrected a math error on the sum

Article 13: Buying the Breakfast Hill Landfill price went from \$85K, down to \$1 and back to \$85K. Added wording so voters know it has known carcinogens. Budget Committee explained its 6 Opposed and 2 abstained votes.

Article 15: Corrected the wording as the land is not Conservation property.

Article 16: Corrected amount to \$35K (what was previously approved)

Article 17: Fixed the lease price error to \$15K as it is \$5K per year

Article 26: Select Board action to over-ride 2018 Warrant article that requires voter approval to buy and sell land/property remains with the voters was changed "to Study".

Article 27: Dogs banned all day changed "To Study"

Article 28: Removed the connections to Article 27, will now have consistent summer dog hours (No dogs all days 9am to 7pm during the summer).

Article 29: Making Conservation Commission elected changed "To Study"

Article 30: Select Board effort to required all Conservation purchases require an appraisal and be no more than 20% different, was changed "To Study".

Article 31: Petitioned Warrant Article to move to a 5 Member Select Board was modified to use the RSA specific language that could no longer be modified at the Deliberative Session.

- **2)** Select Board, School Board and Budget Committee are the only competitive races for the March 11th. Note: Candidates night is March 6th 7pm RJH.
- 3) Budget Committee raised questions and insisted on more information to understand why the Select Board signed a \$85K Purchase and Sale agreement to buy the Breakfast Hill Landfill that is emitting carcinogens into the water system. As Rye is the landfill permit holder, the town benefit from owning the landfill was unclear. Budget Committee vote was 6 opposed to recommendation, 2 abstained.
- **4)** Only one Budget Committee opposed fully bonding the \$789K for the Fire Engine. See analysis produced by Budget Committee Member Dumas. <u>Click Here.</u>

- **5)** Annual Civic League <u>Budget</u> and <u>Warrant (includes explanation of 2024 taxes). For video recording <u>Click Here</u> and for presentation Note these will be updated to reflect changes made at the Deliberative Meeting.</u>
- **6)** NH RSA 32:15 prohibits district commissioners and Select Board members from being elected as atlarge Budget Committee members. Scott Marion stepped down from the Budget Committee as he is also a Water Commissioner. Budget Committee member questioned why the Town/Town Counsel had not acted on this sooner.
- 7) Town is accepting the two Solar Panel Grants, one for \$79K for the Public Safety Building and the other \$46K for Recreation. Part of the Safety Building roof will be replaced first.
- 8) Suggestions and ideas from new Rye Water District (RWD) Administrator resulted in substantial 2024 RWD Savings, so 2025 Budget is lower, some warrants will be funded from un-assigned account balance and buying down the tax rate.
- **9)** Planning Board along with members of the Master Plan Steering Committee held hours of sessions to discuss Planning Board and RWD comments. <u>See Draft.</u> February 18th Planning Board will hear inputs from the Public.
- **10)** Jenness Beach Village District did not present a budget to the Budget Committee.

January 29th District Meeting

- 1) RBVD Budget Treasurer Report Recommended
- 2) JBVD did not attend or present a budget
- 3) RWD Budget Budget Warrant Recommended
- **4)** New Administrator Goetz has saved RWD several hundred thousand dollars from the 2024 budget. Savings will be used for buying down taxes and 2025 Warrant articles.
- **5)** The Lead Pipe inspection bond is actually a revolving fund that will reimburse for the work as it is completed. Repayment is at the end with an expected 71% forgiveness.

January 23rd Budget Committee Meeting.

- 1) Select Board did not produce a warrant article for the Town and Default budgets so an additional. meeting was required.
- 2) Select Board still did not provide an updated budget summary for the committee.

- **2)** Detailed discussion and public comment on the Landfill. It appeared the Town did not reach out to NH DES for guidance and support for this acquisition.
- 3) Discussion of \$120K for a Tennis Court. Was recommended 6-0 with one abstention.
- **4)** The \$789K Bond for the Fire Engine was discussed with the analysis from Kate Dumas. Select Board Representative Wright stated that the Select Board would not modify the warrant.
- 5) Public Hearing opened on the Town Budget. There was no updated Green Sheet of the most current budget available to the Committee or the Public. There were known budget changes but no additional

updates to budgets provided by the Select Board.

- **6)** Chair Ross gave an overview of the <u>Budget Overview presentation</u>. Copies were provided and discussed. The Sewer Narrative link would be added. It was noted the numbers were from what was provided November 20th and it is known that changes had been made after that date.
- 7) While the Budget Committee provided the updates, Select Board member Wright instructed the presentation to be removed. Note: Budget Committee was not notified of this. <u>Presentation.</u>

4) Member Borne, the only one to not support fully bonding the Fire Engine, attempted to give members one more chance to change their recommendations on the more expensive full bonding of the \$789K. See updated analysis from Member Dumas. No action taken.

January 9th: Budget Committee meeting

- 1) Chair Scott Marion resigned as Water Commissioner, as he can't also be serving as an at-large member of the Budget Committee. Budget Committee member questioned why the Town/Town Counsel had not advised/acted sooner.
- 2) Vice Chair Jeff Ross was nominated as Chair, but Select Board Representative Wright recommended Michael Coutu as Chair. A tied vote led to a long standstill until M. Coutu withdrew and Jeff Ross was voted Chair and Kate Dumas Vice Chair, Steven Borne remains clerk.
- 3) Public Comment included former Select Board Member Tom King clarifying how Municipal Financing is different from business financing and the key point is that each tax year contributes to the equipment needed to provide services. Many members of the public with children in Rye schools and others spoke in support of the School budget.
- 4) All School Warrants were recommended by the Budget Committee.
- **5)** Long discussion about the \$85K proposal to purchase the Breakfast Hill Landfill and more information is needed.
- **6)** Budget Committee did not have all the information about the Town's plans for fully bonding the \$789K for the Fire Engine. Only one member opposed spending more than is needed just for the sake of bonding.
- 7) All other discussed warrant articles were recommended unanimously.
